### THE RABBI SPEAKS



### **RABBI BARRY BLOCK**

Dear Friends:

Have you ever thought of the similarities between Yom Kippur, Judaism's most solemn holy day; and Purim, its most frivolous holiday?

The medieval mystics made a pun on the names of the holidays. In Hebrew, Yom Kippur is Yom Kippurim. With a slight change only in

the vowels, that could be read Yom K'Purim, "a day like Purim." How in the world could Yom Kippur—fasting, solemn prayers, and somber moods—be like Purim, with its costumes, carnivals, festive meal, and noise-makers?

Perhaps the connection between Yom Kippur and Purim is all about masks. On Purim, we don costumes, reminiscent of the fact that Esther hides her Jewish identity from her husband, King Ahasuerus, until she must reveal it, risking her crown and her life to save her people.

Rabbi Rachel Barenblat, who blogs as "The Velveteen Rabbi," writes, "We all wear masks in daily life. Maybe we hide our vulnerability. Maybe we hide our yearnings. ... We may hide our strength. We may hide emotions that we learned, in childhood, it wasn't safe for us to manifest or express: fear, or anger, or joy."

On Yom Kippur, we are asked to remove those masks, at least between ourselves and God, revealing the brokenness that can make our lives a struggle. We may also try on new masks: The person who has been dishonest may "try on" truth, even if it doesn't feel like a "good fit" at first. Mussar, Jewish ethical discipline, teaches us to pretend to be patient, for example—to wear the "mask" of a patient face—even when we feel impatient, as a first step to developing patience. We may start to be the better people we hope to be in the New Year by "faking it until we make it," i.e., by wearing a mask of goodness.

Let us all engage in repentance with sincerity this Yom Kippur. Then, we will find one more similarity between Yom Kippur and Purim: The festive meal, breaking the fast with joy, as we all try on our new, more praiseworthy, "masks."

You won't want to miss this opportunity to meet Temple members from our past, as professional actors deftly bring them to life at Oakland Jewish Cemetery. This popular program will showcase Ellen Rae Kaufman and Harvey Luber, both of blessed memory.

We will also perform the sacred Jewish ritual of burying prayer books and other sacred books that can no longer be used. Our Religious School students will participate in the burial. This Sukkot, once again we will gather in the Sukkah and enjoy a meal together. There will be many times during the time of Sukkot that visits, snacks, and meals will take place in our Sukkah. The space is cozy and peaceful and this year falling in October, the weather should be beautiful.

In addition of the custom of decorating the Sukkah and dwelling in it for the week, we also invite special guests from our past to symbolically enter the Sukkah, one for each night. These guests include some famous folks including Abraham, Sarah, Isaac, Rebecca, Jacob, Leah, Rachel, Moses, Miriam, Aaron, Joseph, Ruth, and David.

I wonder if you had the opportunity to invite anyone into the Sukkah, who would you choose? One of the sages mentioned above? Or someone else from history? The past, present, someone in science, education, medicine, law or even politics? An activist perhaps? Or an artist? We learn from everyone – past or present. After the program, we had a beautiful reception generously provided by LaFTY parents and families. To end the night LaFTY, with the help of Rabbi Block, led the Selichot service which allowed the congregation to reflect on the year that is coming to an end as well as prepare for the Days of Awe approaching.

After leading the adults of the congregation in prayer, LaFTYites were ready to hit the ground running when it came time to prepare for the Rosh Hashanah Children's service. The Rosh Hashanah activity was led by LaFTY past president, Hallie Pingel. 
