THE RABBI SPEAKS



RABBI BARRY BLOCK

Dear Friends:

Our sages consider the first *mitzvah* in the Torah to be, "This month shall mark the beginning of the months for you; it shall be the first of the months of the year for you" (Exodus 12:2). What month is Exodus describing? If you answered, "Tishri, the month of Rosh Hashanah," that would be a good guess, but incorrect all the

same. We celebrate the new year "In the seventh month on the first day of the month" (Leviticus 23:24). Instead, the first mitzvah is the obligation to recognize Nisan, in springtime, the month of Passover, as the first month of the year. That day falls on March 26 this year, just a few days after the vernal equinox and official beginning of spring.

How can the first day of the first month be some time other than the new year?

The Mishnah, our sages' first Jewish legal code, explains: "There are four new years" (Mishnah Rosh Hashanah 1:1). We begin counting months in springtime. We celebrate the new year of the human soul on Rosh Hashanah. We mark the new year for the trees on Tu Bishevat. And the rabbis declared a fourth new year for a certain kind of tithe that was only in effect in Temple times.

If we think about it, our own lives include several "new years" each year. We celebrate on Rosh Hashanah and also on January 1. Each of us begins a new year in our lives on a birthday. Many of us experience life on an academic calendar, and we schedule accordingly, as we do at the Temple. And many companies and nonprofit organizations, including Congregation B'nai Israel, operate with a fiscal year that does not begin on January 1. (Ours is June 1.)

The Torah has a special reason for designating *Nisan* as the first month, and the rabbis had good cause to amplify that. The natural world is "reborn" in springtime—albeit at an entirely different time of year in the southern hemisphere, unknown to the authors of Torah or Mishnah. More importantly, the Israelites are born as a people with the liberation from bondage, pointing toward receiving the Torah at Sinai.

I would suggest one additional lesson from the fact that we celebrate multiple new years: Life often presents us with a need to "hit a reset

button." We need new beginnings: Examples may be new job, a new home and perhaps a new hometown, or a new life after a traumatic loss. Sometimes, we need to reset a relationship. We need to become the person we're destined to be, but haven't been—a process well known to converts as it is to those who have come out as LGBTQ, but not confined to those circumstances.

I pray that, just as we celebrate on January 1, and consider our souls on Rosh Hashanah, we will all find renewal in spring time, this year and every year.



Confirmation Class Lobbying Yields Results

The Confirmation Class of 5780/2020 traveled to Washington, D.C. in January to participate in the *L'taken* Social Justice Seminar of the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism. At the culmination of their time in D.C., the Confirmation students presented talks to Sen. John Boozman, Rep. Bruce Westerman, and representatives of Sen. Tom Cotton and Rep. French Hill. In pairs, the students lobbied on issues that they had chosen, based on their own passions: Climate Change, Disability Rights, and Reproductive Freedom. Our representatives and their aides listened attentively to each presentation, pointing out areas of agreement as well as frankly—but in all except one case, politely—-sharing how their views differ from those of our students.

A few weeks after the visit, Rabbi Block received notice from the Religious Action Center of Jewish Disability Rights Advocacy Day. Sen. Boozman and Lesley Hill in Rep. Hill's office had given the indication that they might support the Disability Rights bill about which our students had advocated. The bill--H. 1814 in the House and S. 651 in the Senate—would, at long last, fully fund the ABLE Act, enacted decades ago, requiring that students with disabilities be offered equal public education in the least restrictive and most mainstreamed environment possible. Rabbi Block followed up with Sen. Boozman and with Rep. Hill and his aide, Lesley Hill (no relation to the congressman). A week or so later, both wrote back to let Rabbi Block know that Sen. Boozman had signed on as a cosponsor of S. 651, and Rep. Hill had lent his name as a cosponsor of H. 1814. These moves are most significant, since both Sen. Boozman and Rep. Hill are Republicans, now cosponsoring a bill that previously had almost exclusively Democratic support.

From the Educator

Mezuzot cases are pieces of art. At religious school we usually teach about the mezuzah as a special symbol on the homes of Jewish families for protection. We teach that words of the Shema and V'ahavta on the handwritten parchment are tucked inside the case. We see them a collectable Judaica and they beautifully adorn many Jewish front, back and interior doors. As you may have noticed many times, the mezuzah is affixed on a slant. Do you know why?


In the 11th century, Rashi, a French rabbi and commentator said to hang the mezuzah vertically, while his grandson, wrote that the mezuzah should be affixed horizontally, just like the Ten Commandments and Torah scrolls were kept in the Temple. Hillel and Shammai were two schools of Jewish scholars in the first century CE, who had hearty debates on ritual practice and ethics. They had a very similar debate: Hillel believed that mezuzah should be hung upright reflecting the truth that a person should always stand before God. The scholars of Shammai believed the mezuzah should be affixed horizontally to represent we should always be prone and humble before God. Today the Ashkenazic population of Jews hang the mezuzah on a slant, while the Sephardic still hang it vertically.

The reason the mezuzah is hung diagonally with the top tilting toward the inside of the home is that it was a compromise. Instead of debating the 'correct' way to hang the mezuzah, both schools of thought compromised on the decision.

It's an important lesson for us all – to compromise – on our way, at school, at work, at home, and with others. We know and have learned that when we are unbending and only see black or white and no gray in between, we are rigid. Unbending people tend to cause conflict. Looking at the matter from different perspectives allows us to keep an open mind and avoid destruction, pain, and despair.

The mezuzah is a beautiful symbol of compromise and understanding. When we see the mezuzah hung, we can remember that all of us need to bend some and to keep an open mind, turning a matter over and over until we are satisfied with our decision.

Rabbi Ben Bag Bag said to 'turn it and turn it again..." when referring to the Torah. Now when we see the mezuzah, we can turn to compromise and understanding in our heads and remember that the world is a big place, one chock full of many opinions. Next time there is a big family decision to be made or a fork in the road in your home, meet at the front door and stand under the mezuzah and remember that all compromises make our people and families stronger, together.
