What does Congregation B'nai Israel represent?

Congregation B'nai Israel was founded in 1866 and is a Reform Jewish Congregation active in the Reform movement. We are affiliated with the Union for Reform Judaism, which is the North American Association of Reform temples, and we are a patron of Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion, the seminary for Reform Rabbis. Our Temple membership consists of approximately 350 families.

Why Congregation B'nai Israel?

Our congregation strives to serve Judaism and our members through worship services, Jewish education for children and adults, social and cultural activities, special experiences for all ages, and ceremonies involved in the cycle of life. Coming-of-age ceremonies such as Bar and Bat Mitzvah and Confirmation are an integral part of our Temple life. Members may purchase lots for the purpose of burial in consecrated grounds in the Temple cemetery.

Who is our staff?

Rabbi Barry Block joined our congregation as spiritual leader in 2013. He brings energy, scholarship, and caring to his leadership of our worship services, his care for our congregants, and his efforts in the wider community of Central Arkansas.

Eileen Hamilton, our Director of Education and Youth Engagement joined our staff the summer of 2016.

Religious School teachers include Temple members who give their time and talent to the pursuit of Jewish education.

Our administrative staff includes a Temple Administrator, secretary, bookkeeper, & building maintenance staff.

Temple members volunteer in more capacities than we can count, from leading services when the rabbi is away and providing the beautiful worship music week in and week out to answering phones in the office.

What does it mean to be a member of our congregation?

CONGREGATION B'NAI ISRAEL COMMITMENT PLAN

How our congregation is supported: Congregation B'nai Israel is a non-profit religious institution belonging to its membership. The Officers and Trustees, who are elected at an annual congregational meeting, conduct the business affairs of the congregation in consultation with our Rabbi. The only compensation received by the Officers and Trustees is the satisfaction that they and the members of the many active committees feel from doing their work well. Through careful planning and review, the costs of operation are held to a minimum and are comparable to similar costs of other congregations throughout the United States.

Commitment Determination: The primary source of funding for the Temple's programs are the financial commitments of our members. Our process for pledging financial support is known as T'rumot HaLev (Gifts of the Heart). Each member family decides on a yearly basis the amount they expect to pay towards the financial support of the congregation for the upcoming fiscal year (June 1 – May 31). Forms are sent annually in the spring. A form is included with this application along with an explanation of the process. Yearly pledges are prorated for new members. Please complete the form and return with your application.

SUSTAINING FUND

Shortly after our congregation occupied our present facilities in 1975, payment was completed for our building and property. All of our facilities, together with our rolling and wooded grounds are mortgage free, thanks to the generosity of our members who contributed so whole-heartedly. In order to preserve our place of worship, it deserves our ultimate care. It is also sound business practice to plan for emergencies in maintaining the grounds and buildings. Those funds contributed and pledged by our membership to the Sustaining Fund, money is being set aside and invested to assure preservation of the facilities during and beyond our lifetime.

As new members, you are asked to make a pledge to the Sustaining Fund in an amount of \$1,200 to be paid over a five year period. In this way, you will share in the preservation of our Temple, which will enable it to fulfill the spiritual, educational, cultural, and social needs of our children, and in turn, their children. Pledges to the Temple Sustaining Fund are billed and payments are due monthly, quarterly, or annually as desired. The first installment is to be paid at the time of membership.

I have a great idea for a new program or initiative:

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Adonai spoke to Moses saying, "Tell the Israelite people to bring me gifts; you shall accept gifts (t'rumot) for me from every person whose heart (lev) so moves him. And let them make me a sanctuary that I may dwell among them." – Exodus 25:1-2.

How does T'rumot HaLev work?

Each member unit of Congregation B'nai Israel will receive an annual commitment form in the spring. Members will use the form to pledge the amount of financial support they are able to commit to the congregation for the coming fiscal year. The commitment form also will request that members pledge to participate in the activities of our communal life. Additional space will be provided on the form for members to share ideas, hopes, wishes, and dreams for our spiritual community as well as any concerns. All information on the Annual Commitment Form will be confidential.

What is the "cost" amount?

The "cost" amount that appears on the form is the financial contribution per member unit needed in order for the congregation to meet the expenses outlined in the annual budget. The "cost" amount is a calculated figure that takes into account income available to the congregation from other sources.

How is the "cost" amount calculated?

The Budget Committee in collaboration with the Membership Commitment Committee developed a formula for arriving at the "cost" amount. This formula was approved by the Board of Trustees and is shown below:

(please note there is no increase per family from 2019-2020).

The "cost" amount may change from year to year as your Board continues diligent efforts to reduce expenses. Note that the "cost" amount calculation avoids assuming the ability to take **all** of the available-to-distribute from the Ehrman and Endowment Funds. The formula anticipates taking only 85% of last year's "available to distribute" from the Ehrman Fund and only 50% of 2016 "available to distribute" from Endowment. This protects these funds in the event of poor financial market performance. In addition, taking less from our invested funds will allow them to grow so that income will be available in the event of an emergency or to offset a decline in future membership revenue. Is everyone expected to pay the "cost" amount?

No. We recognize that many members of our congregational family are not able to pledge at the "cost" amount. Fortunately, other members who have been blessed financially are able to pay and do pay at levels substantially above the "cost" amount. As a "fair share" guide, two percent (2%) of gross income is a suggested amount used by many U.R.J. congregations. We provide the "cost" amount for informational purposes. We ask that our members be thoughtful, realistic, and generous. We hope to send the message that all of our members are valued as part of our sacred community regardless of financial means.

Should we include our anticipated Key Club (High Holy Days pledge) contribution in our Annual Membership Commitment pledge?

No. The Key Club (High Holy Day) campaign will continue to be a separate opportunity for assisting the congregation financially. Note that the "cost" amount formula assumes that the congregation will receive 85% of the previous year's Key Club donations as a separate source of income. A shortfall in Key Club donations would increase the "cost" amount.

A Word About Funds

Our congregation is blessed to be the custodian of a number of funds established for the support and enhancement of the congregation and its programs. Most of these funds are restricted so that the income derived is available only for the specific purpose outlined in the fund documents. Therefore, most of our funds do not assist with meeting our annual budget expenses. Rather, the funds allow us to enhance our basic programs and service, offer special programming from time to time, and assist congregants in need. [Exceptions are the Ehrman and Endowment Funds which do support the budget.] Contributions to our various funds are much needed and appreciated. However, the fund contributions should be seen as over and above the basic financial support that our congregation requires to maintain services to our community.

Levels of Giving

Each of our congregants is a precious member of our sacred community regardless of the amount of financial support he or she may be able to provide. We would like to express, as a community, our deep gratitude to those who give at a level that allows our congregation to provide a welcoming home for everyone. We would like to recognize as "Pillars" all those members who give at the "cost" level or above and as "Builders" all those members who increase their level of Annual Membership Commitment by 10% over the preceding year. If you would prefer not to receive this recognition, there will be a space on the Annual Membership Commitment form to request anonymity in this regard.
