

THE RABBI SPEAKS RABBI BARRY BLOCK

Dear Friends,



Most healthy synagogues, like other nonprofits, maintain clear boundaries between governance, meaning the policy-setting role of the Board, and management the implementation of the organization's mission, entrusted to the rabbi and staff. During the pandemic, though, Amanda Orgel, our president at the time, began to join Eileen, our administrative assistant, and me in our weekly staff meetings, helping us think through the constantly changing environment.

To assure that Annabelle would hit the ground running when she would become president, Amanda asked Annabelle to join us in the second year of Amanda's presidency. Annabelle followed suit, including Bruce Greenberg from the beginning of her term.

No, our president is not a staff member, tasked with carrying out the duties of the rabbi or the Director of Administration, Education, and Youth Engagement—or of the administrative assistant, bookkeeper, or custodian—though, of course, Annabelle has assisted each of us in our tasks. To cite one example particularly important to me, Annabelle often leads services or Torah study in my absence.

More to the point, Annabelle has been a valued thought partner to Eileen and me as we consider the programs and services that will best engage and inspire our congregants and guests. She generates terrific ideas and, more importantly, helps Eileen and me sort the wheat from the chaff among our own brainstorms. She partners with Eileen and various lay leaders to assure that we are doing the right things in terms of finance, facility management, and staffing, for example; and with me, about worship and adult learning.



The author(s) of Ecclesiastes stated: "A season is set for everything, a time for every experience under heaven." My term as President of Congregation B'nai Israel is coming to a close, so this will my last monthly article for the Temple Chronicle.

Over the course of the past two years, I have learned so much about what it takes to provide a House of Assembly, a House of Study, and a House of Worship for our community. Every day has brought new opportunities <u>and</u> new challenges in so many areas: Building & Grounds maintenance, Personnel, Programming, Security, Finances, Membership, Music, Religious School, Kitchen, Caring & Sharing, Cemetery, Computer/IT, Archives, just to name a few!

Fortunately, our congregational community has a "Secret Sauce" for getting things done at Temple – a vast number of volunteers who regularly give of their time and talents. It has been my pleasure to become better acquainted with a whole group of folks who bring their Gifts of the Hand without fanfare! If I were to start listing names, this article would never end! To all of you, please accept my praise and gratitude for saying "yes" when your assistance was solicited.

Our Temple's leadership, those who have volunteered to serve as officers and as members of the board of trustees, has been an integral part of the community's decision-making process, asking questions and bringing different perspectives to the table. As I learned while participating in collegial decision-making on an appellate court, having the input of many voices at the table promotes more thoughtful deliberation about the pros and cons of a particular resolution. In other words, "The whole is greater than the sum of its parts." I am sincerely grateful for the questions raised and counsel given by everyone serving in leadership roles throughout my tenure as President of Congregation B'nai Israel.

My attendance at weekly staff meetings has allowed me to watch our Temple staff plan for and implement each week's services, programs, activities, etc. For a significant amount of time over the past 2 years, Rabbi Barry Block and Eileen Hamilton were the only paid staff, due to the post-Covid challenge of locating and hiring qualified personnel for other staff support positions. Now, we are fully staffed – part-time bookkeeper, custodian, and administrative assistant. Barry and Eileen devoted an untold number of extra hours to keeping the Temple ship afloat while we were short-staffed. I will never forget their dedication and commitment to this congregation.

In reflecting on my time as President of Congregation B'nai Israel, I am filled with appreciation for having been given this opportunity to give back to my community – a community that (1) encourages life-long learning of Torah; (2) celebrates "the circle of the seasons, the round of the year, the festivals of joy with which the Jewish people dance our praise to God." (*Seasons of our Joy* by Arthur Waskow); and (3) joins in celebrating the occasions of personal simchas and in giving comfort in times of grief and sorrow.

Although the title of Past President will be welcomed, my personal take-away from this experience revolves around the deepening of my gratitude and love for our sacred community. Yes, there have been some difficult passages as we began to emerge from the social isolation caused by the Covid pandemic. And, yes, some have voiced their disagreement with decisions made by Temple leadership. As we <u>always</u> state with pride, "three Jews, four or even five opinions! That is our strength! I have appreciated hearing all perspectives. Please know that my feelings of friendship for each and every one of you has been strengthened through it all – the times of harmony and the times of discord; the times of speaking and the times of silence; the times of change and the times of stability; and the times of joy and the times of sorrow.

I am especially looking forward to sitting with my fellow congregants in the Sanctuary, facing the Ark and enjoying the view of soaring pine trees!



FROM THE DIRECTOR OF ADMINISTATION, EDUCATION, AND YOUTH ENGAGEMENT

As you know, I have been a Jewish Educator for some time. Each summer, I keep my eyes open for a new and exciting religious school theme for the new year. Sometimes it comes to me easily, while other summers I play around for a while until the lightbulb goes off in my head. I rarely repeat themes, but I have repeated them a time or two. I have begun to contemplate what will be for the 2024/2025 school year, but this year, I am seeking your creative assistance. It's a contest. I will accept ideas for a great religious school year until June 7. I will think about how to develop them and then announce the 'winner' by mid-June. Think hard and creatively. You never know who will come up with the winning idea.

Now for a new subject: attendance. Our Religious School Committee met last year to revise some of the policies and one in particular about attendance. While I truly believe that most families do their very best to attend each class session, most religious school students fall short of the suggested 6 or less absences. This coming year, we will be in touch sooner and more often throughout the year to touch base and make arrangements for equivalent learning experiences. I am pasting the policy below, approved by our Board of Trustees. Please feel free to contact me with any questions. See below.

While attendance at all Religious School sessions is encouraged and preferred, we understand that absences may occur. Congregation B'nai Israel and its Religious School are aware that, from time to time, the trials of life preclude the fulfillment of even the best of intentions. In the event of circumstances that prevent a parent and/or student from complying with any aspect of this policy, parent(s) are encouraged to contact the Rabbi or the DOAEYE to request an exception.

Six absences are permitted each year in Kindergarten through Grade Eight, and three absences are permitted in Grades 9 & 10/pre-Confirmation and Confirmation.

Absences include illness, family vacations, secular school activities, and family emergencies. Whenever possible, please provide advance notice of a planned absence to the Director of Administration, Education and Youth Engagement and the student's teacher.

If a student misses Religious School to attend another Jewish event, and such absence is approved by the DOAEYE or the Rabbi, that absence shall be excused and not counted toward any aggregate number of absences described above. These include attending a B. Mitzvah, life cycle event, or regional youth group gathering, as examples.

If a student exceeds the number of permitted absences in any school year, a required conference will be scheduled with the family, the DOAEYE and Rabbi to discuss the special needs and circumstances of the family that kept the student(s) out of Religious School.

At this meeting, additional learning opportunities will be established and set to be completed by an agreed upon deadline/date. Once completed and a clear demonstration of learning requirements has been met, the student may matriculate to the next grade/stage of religious learning. If these requirements are not met, the student will need to repeat the year. If the family chooses to not attend the required conference or does show good faith efforts to meet grade level requirements, the DOAEYE has the discretion to recommend the student's dismissal.

Our partnership is important to me and with a small school, each body here, in class, and in the temple, makes up an important part of our community.
