THE RABBI SPEAKS RABBI BARRY BLOCK

Dear Friends,

"Let the old year and its curses end."

Those words from the Talmudi sound like a prayer, but in fact they're an explanation. You see, each year, on a Shabbat shortly before Rosh Hashanah, we read a Torah portion that is full of curses threatening the Jewish people. The sages wondered why all those curses are read at this season. A rabbi named Resh Lakish answered, "In order that the year may conclude together with its curses."

We know the curses all too well, long before we read that Torah portion. 5784 has been the most catastrophic year for the Jewish people since the end of World War II. The year will end at sundown on Wednesday, October 2, but we cannot expect that 5784's curses will end with the shofar's calls. Hamas has been tremendously weakened, but Hezbollah, Iran, and the Houthis have enormous capacity and boundless desire to destroy Israel and the Jewish people. The terrorists' useful idiots in North America and around the world, antisemites and ignoramuses who call to "globalize the intifada," will continue to challenge our people around the globe.

The prophet Zechariah, though, calls the Jewish people "prisoners of hope." ii

Zechariah was speaking to the Children of Israel at a time that was even more distressing than 5784. The Jerusalem Temple had been destroyed. The entire Israelite ruling class had been exiled to Babylon, where they famously "lay down and wept for Zion." The people left behind in Judea were faithful neither to God nor to our tradition, so they were in the process of assimilating out of existence.

Then, in Zechariah's lifetime, our ancestors were stunned by an apparent miracle. Cyrus the Persian conquered the Babylonians and permitted the Israelites to return and rebuild the Temple.

The Jewish life that emerged in the Second Temple period would look very different from what came before the Babylonian conquest. Academic Bible scholars tell us that the Torah was largely written at this period, creating a timeless and boundaryless guide for our people's service of God in that day and for millennia into the future.

One calamity of Jewish history after the next has been followed by creativity and growth. On each occasion, the beginning of the healing and recovery was challenging and halting. Still, repeatedly, our people did not merely survive, but thrive. If we are to be imprisoned as the new year begins, then, let us be prisoners of hope.



MY SACRED TORAH

The Scheidt Seminar for incoming presidents of Reform Congregations emphasized the sacred aspect of temple leadership. Individuals were encouraged to develop their own personal sacred Torah. The prayer Eilu D'varim in Mishkan T'filah concludes with the words: "But the study of Torah encompasses them all." For this prayer to be, the true Torah must encompass more than the Chumash, Prophets, and the Writings. Talmud and rabbinic writings are also insufficient.

Writing in the mid-17th century, Spinoza recognized the Chumash as a composite of short stories assembled by men rather than the divine work of God transcribed by Moses. This revelation is largely accepted in modern times but was rejected by his contemporaries. Spinoza did not reject God but looked deeper for meaning than earlier men and women. Spinoza had a vision of God inspired not only from ancient texts but modern knowledge. He

expanded the meaning of Torah far beyond all other commentators. So why do yeshivas teaching outdated myths thrive and the study of Spinoza texts are largely restricted to academics?

Spinoza sought truth and, in many cases, found profound understanding that resonates today in science and philosophy. However, his is the world of the individual. An individual can achieve Nirvana for themselves but not for others. We live in communities and connect to each other through our actions. Spinoza saw rituals as empty relics of superstition. Spinoza missed the importance of human relationships. Rituals are shared experiences that connect people into communities. The specifics of the rituals are not important but are a means of connecting people. The rituals are the threads that form the fabric that is community. We do not need to agree with the message of lyrics or even understand the words that we pronounce in Hebrew or Aramaic to feel the connection.

My sacred Torah is defined by the integration of study and experience. A sacred Torah must include both sacred writings of Judaism but also modern knowledge. When an apparent conflict is present, I will choose the truth, just as Spinoza chose truth over a popular but false conventional narrative. I will side with Einstein over Rashi every day.

Spinoza lived at the dawn of modernity, but we have the advantage of centuries of enlightenment. We can add modern knowledge of anthropology and sociology to better understand the need for human connection in transmitting a culture from generation to generation. This type of human connection is more difficult for me than reaching Nirvana because I cannot do it by myself. This remains the greatest work in progress in my life.

The sacred Torah is not given but must be earned. Modernity demands that we include new knowledge, not just the hard sciences like physics and biology, but anthropology, archeology, psychology, social science and history. All of these must be applied to create a living personal Torah that is sacred.

Samuel Freedman teaches journalism at Columbia University's Graduate School of Journalism. He is the author most recently of into the *Bright Sunshine: Young Hubert Humphrey and the Fight for Civil Rights*, for which Prof. Freedman was awarded the 2024 Hillman Prize for Book Journalism. In the book, Prof. Freedman describes Humphrey's relationships with both Black and Jewish leaders, inspiring him as a young man to dedicate his public service to combatting racial and antisemitic discriminations, decades before he would become the 38th Vice President of the United States. Among Humphrey's Jewish teachers was Alvin Rubin, who he met when he spent a year as a graduate student at LSU, where he confronted Jim Crow and was influenced by Prof. Rudolph Eberle, on exile-by-choice from Nazi Germany.

Prof. Freedman will be in Little Rock as part of the CALS Six Bridges Book Festival. B'nai Israel is grateful to CALS for helping to make Prof. Freedman's visit to us possible.

In February 2024, Prof. Freedman delivered the annual Fritz Bamberger Lecture at Hebrew Union College– Jewish Institute of Religion in New York.

The **Parents Circle - Families Forum** is a joint Israeli-Palestinian organization made up of more than 750 bereaved families. Their common bond is that they have lost a close family member to the conflict. But instead of choosing revenge, they have chosen a path of reconciliation. Through their educational activities, these bereaved members have joined together to take tens of thousands of Palestinians and Israelis on journeys of reconciliation. It is often raw and always emotional. But out of these interactions, comes change. Not the kind of change that makes headlines, but a more personal and profound shift in perspective.

As a joint Israeli-Palestinian peace organization, the PCFF models constructive dialogue around shared values. Even since October 7th, 2023, its staff, members, and thousands of participants are still committed to peace and a way forward that centers around empathy and humanization. The PCFF focuses on the shared value of the sanctity of human life. This conversation brings our attention to the values that Palestinians and Israelis can agree upon even in the darkest of times.

Elana and Eyal Kaminka are members of Kehillat Shir Chadash, the Reform congregation in Tsuru Hadassah, Israel. Longtime coexistence activists, their world was turned upside down on October 7, 2023, when their eldest son, Yannai, was killed in action, heroically protecting basic trainees under his command, Israelis camping on the beach, and the residents of Kibbutz Zikkim. Elana Kaminka is an Israeli involved in multiple grassroots peace initiatives. She is a member of the secretariat of Tag Me'ir, an organization that supports individuals and families who are victims of racist violence, and volunteers as a driver for an organization called Humans Without Borders, which provides transportation to Israeli hospitals for Palestinian children with illnesses.

Khitam Abu Bader is responsible for program development for the Ma'oz South Initiative, collaborating with local leaders. She develops and implements strategic initiatives aimed at fostering regional development in the Negev. Hasan Haj is an educator at Hatzmichim, the Israeli Violence Reduction Organization. He delivers courses for teachers and runs workshops to make the classroom a more comfortable place for everyone. He also works at Beit HaGefen, a Jewish-Arab multicultural center in Haifa, guiding and mentoring teenagers, educators and visitors in that mixed Jewish-Arab city. Khitam and Hasan come to us through the Inter-Agency Task Force on Israeli Arab Issues (IATF), a professional resource center on Arab citizens of Israel created by major American Jewish organizations and foundations to American Jewish promote discourse and engagement on these issues that is informed by the complex realities and current developments on the ground.

The Parents Circle – Family Forum will introduce us to Bassam Aramin and Ayelet Harel



Bassam Aramin lives in the West Bank. At the age of 17, he was incarcerated and spent 7 years in an Israeli jail. He went on to study history and holds an MA in Holocaust studies from the University of Bradford, England. He became a member of the Parents Circle in 2007 after losing his 10-year-old daughter Abir, who was killed by an Israeli border policeman in front of her school. Bassam devotes his time and energies to his conviction for a peaceful, nonviolent end to the Israeli occupation of Palestine and to Israeli-Palestinian reconciliation. Bassam is the former Palestinian Co-director of the Parents Circle – Families Forum and is the current international spokesperson. He is featured in *Apeirogon*, which our Al Barron Book Club plans to discuss in the Sukkah on Sunday, October 20.

Ayelet Harel is Israeli and lives in Givatayim. In 1982, Ayelet's brother, Yuval, was killed while serving during the Lebanon War. Ayelet was 16 at the time. She joined the Parents Circle after a 20 year career as a TV and film producer. Ayelet is the producer of the documentary film *Two Sided Story*. The film follows an encounter group of 27 Palestinians and Israelis who participated in the Parents Circle's Parallel Narrative Experience project.

The Parents Circle – Families Forum (PCFF) is a joint Israeli-Palestinian organization of over 700 families, all of whom have lost an immediate family member to the ongoing conflict. Moreover, the PCFF has concluded that the process of reconciliation between nations is a prerequisite to achieving a sustainable peace. The organization thus utilizes all resources available in education, public meetings and the media, to spread these ideas.





Rabbi Dalia Marx, PhD: Our Scholar-in-Residence for Yom Kippur

She is the lead editor of the Israeli Reform *siddur* (prayer book), *Tfillat HaAdam*.
