### THE RABBI SPEAKS

RABBI BARRY BLOCK



Dear Friends,

This month, the United States will have a new president. Reactions to this moment are polarized. About half of our country is delighted, while the other half dreads the next four

years. That would be fine, except that my teacher, Dr. Micah Goodman, in his book, *Catch -67*, emphasizes: "A disagreement between people each of whom believes that the other is wrong... That's how a good political debate ought to work. But what if I think you are not only wrong but evil? Reasonable disagreement collapses."

How can we have civil conversation in this environment?

First, we must acknowledge that, when people fear that their basic rights—to healthcare and to marriage, for example—are threatened, civil conversation with those who oppose those rights may be neither possible nor desirable.

At the same time, each of us would benefit from understanding that people on both sides of the American political divide are frightened by the party they oppose. Arguing that other people's fears are unfounded will accomplish nothing. We will only move forward as a united nation and society if we will all try to understand fears that we do not share.

Some thoughts about how to engage in these conversations:

- Approach the conversation with curiosity. Do not assume that the person who voted

differently from you does not share your values; they may instead have a different view about how to accomplish the same goals you cherish.

- Criticize policies you find troubling, rather than the people who are making them.
- Do not assume that everybody who voted for a certain candidate supports everything on the candidate's agenda, even less that they share the views of extremists who also supported that candidate.
- Know and articulate your limits: Nobody should pretend that a conversation about your right to be the person God created you to be, with all the rights that every American enjoys, is a civil dialogue. When that's not the case, though, try, and then try harder, not to be triggered by arguments you find distasteful.

Dr. Goodman reminds us that our rabbinic sages almost always favored Hillel in his disagreements with Shammai. Why? Shammai and his followers lived and worked in what we call an echo chamber. They "refused to hear or listen to the positions of ... Hillel. They would study and teach their own opinions exclusively." Hillel and his disciples, by contrast, would examine Shammai's teachings before making their own rulings. "In the end, God chose Hillel" because he and his followers "were eager to learn from others. Ultimately, religious law is determined...by the side that is willing to listen."

If we will listen to one another, America will be the winner.

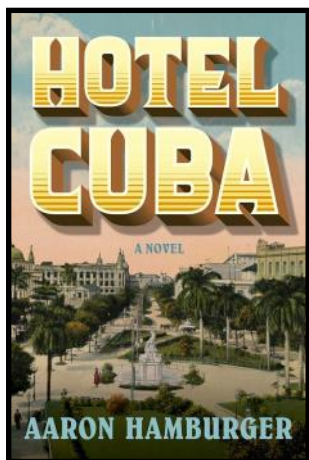
## From Lewis Krain, President

I'm writing this as 2024 wraps up and I wrap up the last of my Hanukkah presents. It's been a year of unexpected events for all of us, and most of us are ushering in 2025 with an agenda we wouldn't have anticipated last December. For me, the biggest thing on that agenda is the sudden arrival of my turn as President of Congregation B'nai Israel. I hadn't planned for this quite yet, and I don't think anyone is happy with the circumstances, but I feel up for the task and ready to embrace the challenge.

If you don't know me, I'm the son of New York Jews who moved here when I was three years old. I grew up in Little Rock and then went to college in Michigan, where there's an active on-campus Jewish culture. Thus my upbringing has been a mix of Jewish traditions from across the country. We attended the Synagogue growing up, but the Temple has always been a huge part of my life. I was in one of the first classes of Ati'Day Pre-School; one of my earliest memories is making clay menorahs in the glass-enclosed classrooms at the back of the Temple. As a teenager, when all my friends were working fast food jobs, I hurried to the Temple after school to be an assistant during the pick-up shift of Ati'Day daycare. On the weekends, I babysat for the Jewish kids I met there. When I returned to Little Rock after college my family had switched to the Temple and I went with them. Starting a family of my own, the Temple has been the anchor of my kids' Jewish experience; my children danced in the aisle at All-Music Shabbat and explored the nooks and corners of our expansive building (who are those chairs next to the sanctuary for, anyway?). I joined the Board to continue my parents' legacy of service to the Jewish community, and tried to build my reputation as a thoughtful listener who takes a measured approach to problem solving.

Now, in 2025, my goals as President are simple and concrete: keep the congregation moving forward, address gaps in staffing and policies, and most importantly, tend to the physical needs of our Temple. The building is 50 years old and is showing its age. We have a to-do list of HVAC, plumbing, structural repairs, roofing, and on and on. I'll bring as much attention as I can to these issues. Of course, we'll continue our Religious School for the kids, Adult Jewish Learning, and other programs as well.

If you'd like to learn more about me or the rest of the CBI leadership, the Board of Trustees will be hosting dinner for the congregation on January 10th. This is your chance to spend some time with the Board members, get to know us better, and tell us your thoughts and priorities on the direction of the Temple. I'd love to see you there, or on any Friday night, or any of the events coming up in the next year. Here's to a busy and productive 2025 and Congregation B'nai Israel.

### REPORT AN ANTISEMITIC OR BIAS INCIDENT

We all have a responsibility to report and respond to antisemitism or hate when we see it.

#### What should I report?

You should report any incident you perceive as antisemitic, biased or hateful.

Here are some examples:

- Antisemitic or other hateful graffiti in public places, including synagogues and schools.
- Vandalism of religious artifacts such as mezuzahs and menorahs and holy places.
- Online harassment, including hateful social media posts and emails. Remember to take a screenshot!
- Verbal harassment, including emails and voicemails.
- Media-based incidents, including antisemitic or hateful content in a news story.
- White supremacist propaganda.
